A Community Celebration and 2012 Campaign Kickoff

The Federation is pleased to announce that **Marc Blattner** will be the featured speaker at the October 23 kickoff event for the Federation's 2012 campaign, "**The Changing Face of Oregon's Jewish Communities**". Mr. Blattner currently serves as the President and CEO of the Jewish Federation of Greater Portland. Previously, he has been a key senior officer of Jewish Federations in Philadelphia, Atlanta, and Baltimore.



Additionally, **Rabbi Maurice Harris** and **Paul Bessemer** will be honored with the Federation's Community Service Award, and **Elah Seidel** and **Liberty Siegle** will receive the Federation's Young Jewish Leadership Awards.

Federation President **Rae LaMarche** will give her annual report and talk about plans for 2012. Social Services Coordinator **Debra Weinman** will review her year with Jewish Family Services and share needs for the coming year. A desert buffet and no-host cocktails will be available throughout the evening.

The Federation Board has set a 2012 campaign goal of \$80,000 in a major effort to boost revenues back to prior year levels after having to reduce annual allocations 10% the past two years notwithstanding increased needs of Jews in our community. This will represent an increase of 15% over 2011 contributions. Federation's campaign also provides community members with a convenient, one-stop opportunity for contributing to the needs of Jews worldwide through Federation's allocations to the Jewish Federations of North America (previously United Jewish Appeal). Campaign letters will reach community members during the first week of October.

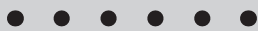

It Could Be You Or Me

Each client who comes to Jewish Family Services has a story to tell. What caused the crisis they are experiencing, and how — or if — we can help them. Each story is vastly different. Following a meeting with a client I often find myself thinking or saying, “this could be any of us.” I’m not so sure I’ve really believed this after all, most of us are educated, have jobs that offer benefits, and have a little bit saved for a rainy day. Aren’t our clients those who work for low wages and have no benefits? Could I really find myself in the Federation office in need of services?

That’s how Susan felt when she came to us to have her power reconnected. It had been off for almost a week and she and her 12-year-old daughter were tired of candles and non-perishable food. I saw a look of horror, fear, and despair on her face as she came into my office.

As Susan told her story in a trembling voice she explained that she has a Ph.D and owns her own business, but that things have been so slow the past year or two that she had to resort to using her savings to pay the mortgage and basic bills. A car wreck three months ago left her unable to work at all, which forced her to deplete her savings.

Jewish Family Services got her power restored and gave food and grocery gift cards to this family of two. I was able to connect her with additional resources in the community to address some of her employment and disability issues.

When I handed Susan the check and gift cards she whispered a soft thank you, but couldn’t make eye contact. I wish she hadn’t been so embarrassed, but I do understand.

After all — that could have been you or me.

Shalom, Federation supporters!

I hope that the summer, having finally arrived, is treating you well. Oregon Hillel has had another year of growth — at least in terms of the number of students we're seeing, and we expect that trend to continue into the next year as UO enrollment and the commensurate number of out-of-state students increases.

Our financial situation continues to be somewhat uncertain, as every step forward seems to be met by a step back, but after making major cuts over the past several years, and significantly streamlining our operations we have managed to largely avoid cuts to student programming, which is, after all, our *raison d'être*. This year we will be having largely student-led High Holiday services on campus — the first time that they'll take on both Rosh Hashana *and* Yom Kippur; in this way we are fulfilling our mission of empowering students, encouraging them to “step up,” as well as saving the cost of hiring a rabbinical intern.

Another way that we have both reduced costs and expanded our reach is by pursuing greater collaboration with both campus and other Jewish organizations. The past year we have forged a stronger bond of collaboration with the Jewish Students' Union, the Jewish fraternity *Alpha Epsilon Pi*, and the UO Residence Halls, all of which will lead to lower costs and —we hope — greater participation at this year's events. Our deepening relationship with Portland Hillel saw us collaborate on a joint leadership development weekend, another successful Oregon Birthright bus this summer and an upcoming reunion for the latter. There are already plans for a repeat performance this year, as well as a joint Alternative Spring Break trip to New York!

Aside from this, we will continue our regular programming from last year, including our weekly Shabbat services and meals, as well as adding some new ones.



Despite this great flurry of activity, we continue to face financial challenges and remain dependant upon your support to enable us to continue to provide the venue, possibilities, and support for our Jewish students. They represent our Jewish future, and we will continue to do our utmost to ensure its continuity.

Recording the Graves

Honoring the deceased is an ancient Jewish tradition. Prayers are recited annually, and yahrzeit candles are lit to commemorate the anniversaries of the deaths of loved ones. A visit to the cemetery is customary at least once a year. A small stone is placed on the tombstone as a sign that the deceased has been remembered.

Since the Jewish community is a truly world-wandering lot, by virtue of choice or circumstance, many family members no longer know the location of family gravesites. However, there is now an online archive of Jewish burials worldwide, where one can search for and find the graves of family members. This service is free of any charges (<http://www.jewishgen.org/databases/Cemetery>).

The JewishGen Online Worldwide Burial Registry (JOWBR) is a growing permanent archive for Jewish burial records on the Internet. As of December 2010, JOWBR had 1.5 million burial records from 3,000 cemeteries in 47 countries. Some of the records include Hebrew names of the deceased, parents' names, place of birth, etc., in addition to the text on the headstone.

More than ten years ago, members of what is now the Jewish Genealogical Society Willamette Valley Oregon (JG-SWVO) visited the dedicated Jewish section at Rest Haven Cemetery, recorded the names of people buried there, and submitted the data to JOWBR.

We are currently updating our cemetery data and expanding the records to other Jewish burial sites in the area. Contact us with information on local Jewish burials that are outside of the Rest Haven Jewish section, so we can include your friends and family members. Also, give us details about the parents of the deceased, their original surname, birthplace, etc. for any Jewish graves in Lane County.

JCRC Is Voice Defending Israel

One of the goals of the Jewish Community Relations Council is to dedicate ourselves to the safety and security of the state of Israel.

The JCRC continues to engage the community when Israel is unfairly attacked. The source of unfair criticism is often a local pro-Palestinian lobby whose members have a virulent hatred of the Jewish state. But not always. Some local institutions have climbed aboard the anti-Israel bandwagon from time to time.

Earlier this year the City of Eugene Human Rights Commission adopted a resolution, at the request of the Palestinian lobby, criticizing Israel's right to defend itself in the Gaza flotilla incident. This decision was disappointing for many reasons, including that the Commission knew little about the controversy and did not solicit opposing points of view. The Commission withdrew the resolution after the Jewish and Christian communities turned out en masse to speak against it at a subsequent Commission meeting.

Another challenge the JCRC faced head on was the Lord Leebrick production of *I Am Rachel Corrie*. Our concern was not LL's decision to produce the play, but the likelihood that it would be used by the local Israel-haters as a platform for its propaganda. We worked with LL in an attempt to provide some context in the promotional materials, but much to our dismay, our efforts were unsuccessful and our worst fears were realized.

Our community will face another challenge the day after Yom Kippur, when a local film festival will show *Between Two Worlds*, a documentary about conflict in the Jewish community in San Francisco over the decision of a film festival there to show a film about Corrie's death. We will work with the sponsors to avoid a repeat of the LL fiasco.

The JCRC will continue to respond when Israel is unfairly attacked, but we cannot do it alone. We encourage everyone to enter the public square and respond to attempts to demonize and delegitimize Israel in the local media. It is easy to educate yourself about Israel and the Middle East by referencing reliable resources of information.

The Jewish Council for Public Affairs (www.jewishpublicaffairs.org), our parent organization, has an Israel Action Network dedicated to effectively countering attacks on Israel's legitimacy and promoting a fair and balanced understanding of Israel and the situation in the Middle East.

The American Jewish Committee (www.ajc.org) has been working to combat anti-Semitism and all forms of bigotry since 1906. Its Executive Director, David Harris, blogs regularly about Israel's quest for peace and security.

The Daily Alert (www.dailyalert.org) is a digest of hyper-linked news and commentary about Israel and Middle East that will keep you informed about all developments in the region.

Choose your resource, keep informed, and get involved.

Finally, we hope you had the opportunity to visit the JCRC/JFLC booth at the Eugene Celebration. We are excited about the opportunity it provided to expose the community to the good work of our organizations.

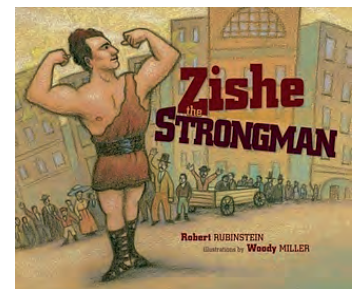

Book Review: *Zishe the Strongman* Based on the life of Sigmund Breitbart

Based on a true biography, this picture book in sepia tones tells of a Polish Jew who emigrated to the U.S. in the early twentieth century and became a famous circus strongman.

The story begins as Zishe uses his teeth and a leather strap to haul a wagonload of ten men down Manhattan's Fifth Avenue before a cheering crowd. Then we track back to Zishe's childhood as the son of a poor blacksmith in Lodz, Poland. At three, Zishe could swing a nine-pound hammer. A few years later, he could bend a metal bar with his hands. Despite his strength, he was gentle, too; we see him playing cello for children in the local hospital.



His reputation as the heroic Samson attracted crowds as he traveled across Europe, continuing his amazing feats in the U.S. A back page fills in more of the biographical details. This title makes a lively addition to other stories of Yiddish immigration.

About the Raul Wallenberg Foundation

The International Raoul Wallenberg Foundation is an educational NGO with offices in New York, Jerusalem, Buenos Aires, and Berlin. The mission of the IRWF is to conduct historical research and documentation, and educate about Raoul Wallenberg and other brave Heroes of Holocaust.

More than two hundred Heads of State, Nobel Prize Laureates, Governors, and distinguished personalities from all walks of life accompany us in this singular enterprise as our Honorary Members.

Core programs and initiatives:

Education: The IRWF has developed curricula emphasizing the values of human dignity, liberty, justice and equality as exemplified by Wallenberg and other WWII Heroes. The Foundation organizes workshops for teachers, provides schools with the material, and helps them organize presentations with the presence of Wallenberg survivors.

Research: The investigation of Rescuers of the Holocaust is an ongoing project of the foundation. Our research team focuses on unknown cases of rescue, involving diplomats and individuals, regardless of their religion or citizenship.

Raoul Wallenberg Day Proclamation

WHEREAS in January 1944, the United States War Refugee Board asked Sweden to send a representative to Hungary to organize rescue operations for the Jewish community;

WHEREAS Raoul Wallenberg, with extraordinary courage, managed to save the lives of some 100,000 men, women, and children;

WHEREAS Raoul Wallenberg risked his own life countless times during his work, dragging Jews from trains bound for gas chambers, bringing food and blankets to those on death marches, creating Swedish Safe Houses, and unflinchingly challenging Nazi authorities;

WHEREAS Raoul Wallenberg has become a symbol of each human being’s concern for every fellow human being, an example to be followed, and an inspiration to uncover and fight for justice and understanding; and

WHEREAS on October 5, 1981, the President of the United States signed into law a proclamation making Raoul Wallenberg an honorary citizen of the United States;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, John Kitzhaber, Governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby proclaim October 5, 2011 as Raoul Wallenberg Day in Oregon.
